1970 Program of Field Trips

Only series subscribers to the Speakers Program may purchase tickets for the Field Trips, which are designed to complement the topics discussed and are held in the week following the discussion on a Tuesday or a Wednesday schedule: Tuesday subscribers will be assisted, to the extent possible, in exchanging tickets with Wednesday subscribers at the end of the Speakers Program preceding that tour; no other ticket exchange is provided. A ticket must be presented for admission, and tours must be taken on the day for which the ticket is issued. There are no refunds on field trip tickets, and no replacement of lost tickets can be made.

The price of each tour is \$7.00. Luncheon (gratuity included) is provided on all tours. Tours are limited by the capacity of the places to be visited; the limit is stated in the tour description. All tours (except Tour Five, see below) will depart from and return to the Downtown Center, 65 E. South Water Street. The tours operate on closely co-ordinated time schedules, and the departure of buses cannot be delayed for late-comers. Comfortable shoes are recommended. Since program arrangements must be made many months in advance, scheduled events may sometimes be subject to change.

IMPORTANT NOTICE TO SUBSCRIBERS: The Know Your Chicago Committee has been gratified by the great success of its annual series, but also much concerned about the growing number of subscribers who are unable to obtain tickets for the Program of Field Trips. Last year the Field Trips were entirely sold out three days after the tickets were placed on sale and almost one hundred subscribers had to be turned away. Because of the limited capacity of the Field Trips and the number of tickets that can be made available, The Committee has reluctantly decided to limit all Field Trip subscriptions to a maximum of four tours. This restriction, while it may disappoint many past subscribers, will make possible an increase of more than 30% in the number of renewing and new subscribers who can participate this year. It should also, to the same extent, increase the opportunity for each subscriber to obtain tickets to those tours he most prefers. Please read carefully the new instructions on How to Order Tickets.

TOUR ONE

Tuesday Sept. 22 Wednesday Sept. 23 (Limited to 120 each day.) Assemble 9:00 A.M. in Room 700 of the Downtown Center, 65 E. South Water Street. Slides on methods of treatment will be shown, followed by a panel discussion on education for prevention of drug abuse. Dr. Charles R. Schuster, Associate Director, Drug Abuse Rehabilitation Program, The University of Chicago, will moderate. Panelists will be Dr. Ellen Brachtl, Head, Department of Curriculum, Chicago Board of Education; Earl Durham, Director of Research, St. Leonard's House; Mrs. Roy G. Nagle, Teacher, Francis Parker School. Lunch at the Red Carpet. The tour will then visit with residents of a Gateway House (Chicago's largest center for drug rehabilitation). Return by 3:30 P.M.

TOUR TWO

Tuesday Oct. 6 Wednesday Oct. 7 (Limited to 120 each day.) Depart promptly 9:00 A.M. En route, a brief walking tout of landmark buildings on Dearborn Street and visits to the B. & O. Railway Station (designed by S. S. Beman, also the architect for Pullman City) and the Widow Clarke House, oldest in Chicago. The visit to Pullman (created by George Pullman in 1880) will include a lecture and slide presentation by Norbert Pointner in the Greenstone Church, lunch in the church annex, and a tour of one of the first planned communities in the United States. The return trip will include Kimball House and a visit to the Glessner House, now the site of the Chicago School of Architecture Foundation. Tour ends at approximately 3:30 P.M.

TOUR THREE

Tuesday Oct. 20 Wednesday Oct. 21 (Limited to 110 each day.) Depart 9:00 A.M. for Adler Planetarium, 900 E. Achsah Bond Drive, Brief lecture in the newly remodeled Sky Theatre and a viewing of the distinguished collection of new and antique astronomic instruments. In the Park District Administration Building, an informative presentation by park officials will focus upon "What's New in Our Parks." Visit to Washington Park for a tour of the new Marshall F. Bynum Adventure Playland, Lunch at Batt's. Afternoon tour of Garfield Park Conservatory, the newly dedicated Garden for the Blind, and special admission to green houses where plants for display purposes are grown. Buses return at approximately 3:30 P.M.

Proceed to the Art Institute where Shirley Sherman, director of the School of Fashion Design, will present a program which will include a fashion show. Lunch in a private dining room of the Institute. Dr. John Reich and other members of the Goodman Theatre Company will then present a program on the theater today, and the group will visit the Goodman Theatre to watch a technical rehearsal. Tour ends at the Goodman Theatre at approximately 2:45 P.M.
