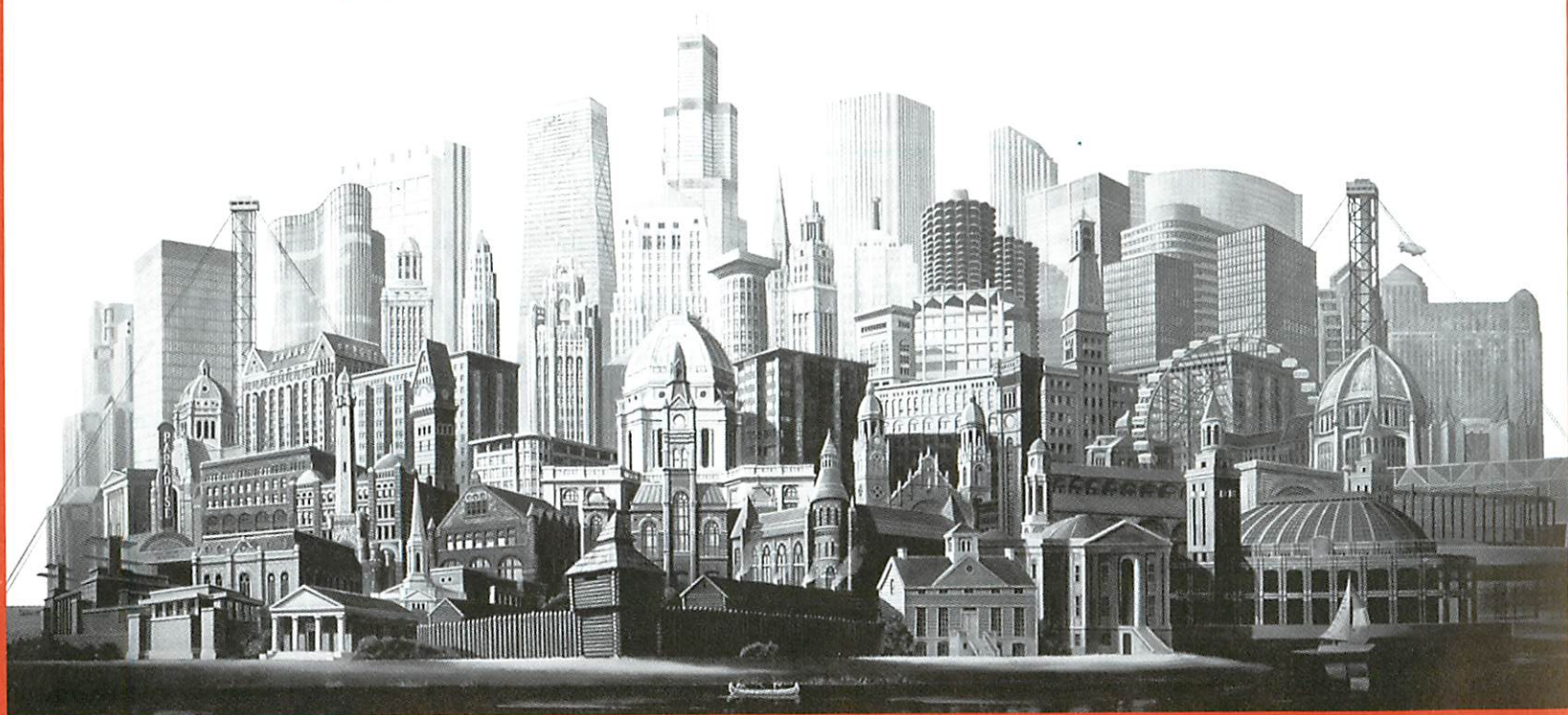

SPECIAL FEATURES OF THE 2005 PROGRAM

The symposium will be at the University of Chicago's Ida Noyes Hall. Use of the buses for the symposium is optional but encouraged; you may drive, but try to carpool because of extremely limited parking. A meal is provided at the Symposium and on all tours.

Color-coded Symposium and tour tickets are valid only on the dates for which they are issued and must be presented for admission. There are not separate tickets for the buses.

Please note: Tours Two and Five meet on Wednesdays and Thursdays, the others on Tuesdays and Wednesdays. Tours One and Five require stringent security measures. IDs are necessary, and no electronic devices or purses are permitted in the tour venues. Tour One will be strenuous. Tour Three is an afternoon and evening tour with a limited number of places available for dinner and evening show only.

Subscribers will board downtown buses on the west side of Clinton Street, immediately south of Madison Street, diagonally across from the Ogilvie Transportation Center (formerly Northwestern Station). The office will mail bus and parking directions with this year's ticket orders.

Tours operate on closely coordinated schedules, and the departure of buses cannot be delayed for latecomers. Scheduled events are subject to change. Tours may involve a considerable amount of walking, standing, and stairs. Comfortable shoes are recommended. Smoking and the use of cell phones are not permitted on the buses.

Tour chairmen or their representatives may require subscribers whose physical limitations will expose them to danger or will delay the progress of a tour to return to the bus or to withdraw from the tour. Know Your Chicago considers participants without regard to race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, age, national or ethnic origin, or other factors irrelevant to participation. Persons with a disability who believe they may need assistance, please call Sylvia Fergus in advance of the symposium or tours at 773/702-1727.

Every effort will be made to get participants back at the announced time; occasionally there may be unforeseeable delays.

HOW TO SUBSCRIBE

Tickets are filled by lottery to ensure an equitable distribution of tickets to new and continuing subscribers. A complete order form must be filled out by each subscriber; copies of the order form are acceptable. The only form of payment accepted is VISA®, MasterCard®, or Discover®. The transaction will be displayed on your credit card statement with the following caption: "UChicago Graham School." Payments made by check will be returned with the order unfilled. To participate in the lottery, envelopes must be postmarked by August 8 and received by August 12.

Because the symposium provides an informative introduction to the tours, only symposium subscribers may purchase tour tickets. No telephone inquiries before September 1, 2005, unless it concerns how to fill out your order. The Know Your Chicago phone number is 773/702-1727.

If two or more subscribers wish to attend one or more tours together, their orders must be mailed in the same envelope and with the tours listed in the same order of preference. Please mark the form carefully since the tickets are nonrefundable. After September 1, subscribers may purchase available tour tickets at the symposium, fill out a form at the symposium to be placed on a waiting list, or call 773/702-1727.

More than 159 years ago, Dr. Wallace C. Abbott founded the Abbott-Alkaloidal company in Ravenswood, Illinois. Today, Abbott Laboratories is a broad-based medical products pharmaceutical company that is listed as number 48 among the top 500 companies by *Forbes Magazine* and has been named as one of America's Most Admired Companies every year since 1984 by *Fortune Magazine*. Since Abbott does not offer public tours of its facilities, this private tour offers a rare opportunity to visit the headquarters of the largest company in Illinois and a prominent leader in the health care industry. We will begin with a visit to Abbott House, a recently completed replica of Dr. Abbott's original home, to learn about the company history and view hundreds of artifacts dating back to the late 1800s. We will also have the opportunity to stroll through the Abbott House grounds where we can learn about the plants that were identified by Dr. Abbott and others as having medicinal value. A walking tour through tablet manufacturing and packaging operations will be followed by a driving tour through the Abbott Park campus which covers nearly 500 acres. Following a luncheon in Abbott House, one of Abbott's top research scientists will discuss the complexities of pharmaceutical research and discovery. *Note: the walking portion of the tour requires walking and standing for more than one hour. Cell phones, cameras, tape and video recorders, and large purses are prohibited inside the facility, but can be left on the bus. No smoking is permitted. Participants must be 16 or older. A picture ID must be shown. All ticket exchanges must be made and reported to the office no fewer than five days before the tour.*

A visit to the Chicago Botanic Garden, with its 300 plus acres of dazzling gardens and glorious landscapes, is always an unforgettable experience, but especially so in autumn. On this tour we will come away with a deeper understanding of why the Garden in any season is considered not only a haven of beauty, but also an institution dedicated to preserving nature's past and creating plants for the future. We will have a rare opportunity to go far beyond the usual public spaces and will visit "off limits" research facilities, greenhouses, and new construction areas. Our day at the Garden will include a stop at the laboratories where new hybrid flowers are being developed. Techniques used in such plant propagation will be demonstrated. We will see the recently planted *allée* of stately new disease-resistant elms. We will learn about the Millennium Seed Bank and the part scientists at the Botanic Garden are playing in this great worldwide effort to save endangered plant species. A boat ride on one of the beautiful lagoons will offer an opportunity to enjoy the fall colors as well as to see the Garden's model plan for urban lake restoration. Lunch will be served in an area overlooking one of these scenic waterways. Join us for a day of exploration and learning in one of the city's great public spaces, the Chicago Botanic Garden.

There has been a dramatic comeback in an old south side neighborhood that early Chicago movers and shakers called home. Subsequently, it became the glittery, jazzy center of the Black metropolis and then, sadly, it experienced a heart-rending bottoming out. Today, bright, enthusiastic young people with a feeling for the past and a strong desire to make a future have inspired the aldermen, the city, the Illinois Institute of Technology (IIT), private businesses, residents, and artists to join their move to make this a vibrant section of Chicago once again. The public housing projects are down, and new multi-income level developments are springing up. Old mansions are being rehabbed next to tasteful new housing. A visit to the new Harold Washington Cultural Center on 47th Street with its state-of-the-art auditorium and computer labs set up by IIT will be followed by talks with gallery owners and restaurateurs. We will visit the historic Wabash WMCA with its Renaissance Center apartments, the nicest single room occupancy (SRO) facility in Chicago with its innovative program for the residents. At the Little Black Pearl Workshop in North Kenwood we will learn about its amazing park arts program. Dinner will be in the lovely, legendary Parkway Ballroom. Evening entertainment will include a tribute to Chicago musical treasure Oscar Brown, Jr.; by his daughter Maggie Brown, artists from the acclaimed Muntu Dance Theater presenting their interpretation of contemporary and traditional African-American dance, music, and folklore; and even a chance to try the new dance craze, Steppin'.

Chicago is a leader in addressing challenges of hunger and hospitality services. Two of the institutions in the vanguard are the Greater Chicago Food Depository and Kendall College. While each institution offers culinary training, each has a different mission, serves a different population, and faces unique economic challenges. The Greater Chicago Food Depository has recently moved into a vast new facility from which it distributes the equivalent of 85,000 meals a day and serves 600 agencies including pantries, soup kitchens, and shelters. We will be told where the food comes from, who are Chicago's hungry, and who are their supporters. Also, we will learn about the Depository's innovative programs: the ProduceMobile, Kids Cafes, Chicago's Community Kitchens, Food Rescue, Pantry University and the Agency Mart. In September 2004, after 70 years in Evanston, Kendall College moved to a newly renovated eight-story structure on Chicago's Goose Island. The new facilities have generated much interest because the savvy use of space has masterfully combined design and function. We will see glistening demonstration kitchens, stylish furnishings, state-of-the-art equipment, and a private art collection. On the academic side, Kendall has reinvented itself into one of the finest culinary arts programs in the country. Our tour will feature their School of Culinary Arts, hospitality management, and business partnership programs. Add to your knowledge of Chicago by joining "Recipes for Success." It will give you food for thought.

How does a girl find herself behind the walls of a correctional institution? Join us for a unique opportunity to go behind the walls of the Illinois Department of Corrections maximum security facility for juvenile girls. A highlight will be attending a remarkable dramatic production written and performed by the girls, based on their life experiences and facilitated by the talented staff of Music Theater Workshop. We will gain many insights as we tour the living units and talk with the team of dedicated professionals who work to change the lives of these young juvenile offenders. We will hear about programs designed to address the specific needs of this at-risk juvenile population including a comprehensive alcohol and drug rehabilitation program, assessment and treatment of mental health issues, and a program addressing issues of teenage pregnancy, relationships, and parenting skills for girls who are pregnant or already mothers. We will explore how staff meets these and other challenges. Building positive self-esteem and self-awareness is an important component of the programming which includes a creative teaching staff, the Music Theater Workshop, and many dedicated community volunteers who provide specialized activities. What possibilities, problems, and future needs lie ahead for these girls and this facility? We will be able to ask this and other questions of the warden, staff, and other experts. *Participants will need to leave purses, cell phones, cameras, and all personal belongings on the bus. A picture ID will be required to enter the facility. All ticket exchanges must be made and reported to the office no fewer than five days before the tour.*
